#### **RESOLUTION 25C-006**

## RESOLUTION ADOPTING ADDITIONTO DAKOTA COUNTY ZONING REGULATIONS

WHEREAS, the County Board of Commissioners has the authority to amend zoning resolutions which shall have the force and effect of law pursuant to Section 508 of the Zoning Ordinances of Dakota County, Nebraska; and

WHEREAS, the County Board of Commissioners established the Dakota County Planning Commission pursuant to Regulation as set for by Neb. Rev. Stat. §23-114 to 23-114.05, 23-168.04, 23-172 to 23-174, 23-174.02, 23-373 and 23-376; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has determined it reasonable and necessary to add ordinance Section 600.7 Solar Energy (Solar Farm) Overlay District (SOD); and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the County Board to enact the proposed addition of Section 600.7 Solar Energy (Solar Farm) Overlay District (SOD),

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE DAKOTA COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS that this Board makes the following findings of fact:

- I. A public hearing regarding the adoption of proposed addition of Section 600.7 Solar Energy (Solar Farm) Overlay District (SOD) was held on February 18, 2025 before the Dakota County Planning Commission as required by the State of Nebraska. The Planning Commission provided its recommendation of approval as noted in the Planning Department Report Exhibit "A."
- II. A public hearing regarding the adoption of the proposed amendment and revisions to the Dakota County Zoning Regulations, was held by this Board as required by §23-114.01(2).
- III. Notice of each of the Public Hearings described above was published at least ten (10) days prior to each respective public hearing and the proof of publication has been filed in the Office of the Dakota County Clerk.
- VI. Notice of the time and place of each hearing was also given in writing to the clerks of the local governments which have jurisdiction over land within three (3) miles of the property affected by such action as required by Neb. Rev. Stat. §23-164.
- V. The proposed amendment and revisions to be approved by this Resolution are within Section 600.7 of the Dakota County Zoning Regulations. Further the Planning Department report is attached hereto as Exhibit "A."
- IV. The proposed amendment and revisions to the Dakota County Zoning Regulations are consistent with the Dakota County Comprehensive Development Plan and are designed to promote the health, safety, and welfare of the present and future inhabitants of Dakota County.
  FURTHER, BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Board, in light of the above, after due deliberation and

FURTHER, BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Board, in light of the above, after due deliberation and consideration, upon the recommendation of the Planning Commission, adopts the proposed addition to the Dakota County Zoning Regulations Section 600.7, specifically approval of the amendment as shown in Exhibit "A", and directs the Planning Department to amend the Dakota County Zoning Regulations by adding Section 600.7 and that the same have full force and effect of law, the effective date of the aforementioned Zoning Regulations shall be March 17, 2025.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED THAT, pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. §23-114.03, the County Clerk is directed and instructed to, within fifteen (15) days of the date of this Resolution, publish these Regulations in book or pamphlet form or once in a legal newspaper published in and of general circulation in the county, and the County Clerk is further directed to spread these regulations in the minutes of the proceedings of the county board.

FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the regulations enacted by this Resolution are intended to be a complete revision of the existing Zoning Regulations, and all previous Resolutions or parts of Resolutions of the Dakota County Board of Commissioners on said subjects or in conflict with the provisions of this Resolution are hereby repealed. The above Resolution was approved by a vote of the Dakota County Board of Commissioners at a public meeting duly held in accordance with applicable law on the 31st day of March, 2025.

RESULTING FROM BLIZZARD CONDITIONS AND HIGH WINDS CAUSING SEVERE DAMAGE TO POWER POLES, DISRUPTION OF UTILITY SERVICE AND CAUSING ENDANGERMENT OF HEALTH AND SAFETY OF THE CITIZENS OF DAKOTA COUNTY WITHN THE DISASTER AREA.

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. § 81-829.50 authorizes the County Board of Commissioners to declare an emergency exists; and

WHEREAS, for purposes of the Emergency Management Act, Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 81-829.36 through 81-829.75 ("Act"), local government means a county, village, or city of any class;

WHEREAS, for purposes of the Act, a "Disaster" means any event or the imminent threat thereof causing widespread or severe damage, injury, or loss of life or property resulting from any natural or manmade cause;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 22-155 and 23-101, the County of Dakota is a county in the State of Nebraska:

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. § provides that the powers of a county as a body corporate or politic shall be exercised by a county board;

WHEREAS, the Dakota County Board of Commissioners ("Board") is the governing board of the County of Dakota ("County");

WHEREAS, upon the recommendation of the Dakota County Emergency Manager, the Board Chair did sign the attached Disaster Declaration on March 26, 2025, (see attachment);

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. § 81-829.50 provides that a declaration of a Disaster or Emergency shall continue in effect until the Board finds that the Disaster or Emergency has been dealt with to the extent that those conditions no longer exist;

WHEREAS, the Dakota County Board of Commissioners do confirm the Emergency Declaration signed by the Chair as authorized under §81-829-50 on behalf of Dakota County for damage caused by blizzard and high winds. Declaration also committed the expenditure of emergency funds, invoking mutual aid agreements and applying for assistance from Governor's Emergency Fund.

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Dakota County Board of Commissioners that the Emergency Declaration signed by the Chair as authorized under Nebraska Revised Statute § 81-829.50 on behalf of Dakota County for damage caused by the blizzard and high winds be affirmed and expenditure of emergency funds be committed, invoking mutual aid agreements and applying for assistance from the Governor's Emergency Fund, until such time that the Disaster or Emergency has been dealt with and the conditions no longer exist.

Resolved this 31st day of March, 2025.

Stephanie Gatzemeyer, County Treasurer, presented the Tax Sale report. There were 129 parcels sold for \$236,399.37, 48 parcels remain for \$2,146,004.80 of unpaid taxes.

Chair Hohenstein explained to the Board that the County, City of SSC, and Dakota City are working with JEO on the Storm Water Annual Report for 2024 and an updated Interlocal Agreement with City of South Sioux City, Dakota City, and Dakota County Stormwater Management Plan for 2025. Once these documents are completed a copy will be shared.

The Board acknowledged the requests to open negotiations with the three (3) Unions: 1) Sheriff's Deputies Comprehensive Master Agreement – Fraternal Order of Police, Dakota County Lodge #49; 2) Correctional Officers' Comprehensive Master Agreement – Fraternal Order of Police, Dakota County Lodge #49; and 3) Road Department Comprehensive Master Agreement – Nebraska Public Employees Local 251 AFSCME. Chair Hohenstein commented that decisions at the Legislature will make negotiations a little difficult until they are done but will work on setting dates and times to meet with each to get started with negotiations.

Commissioner Bousquet explained that the concrete next to the jail and the courthouse in the back parking lot has sunk and water is getting into the jail. He received 2 bids to have the concrete jacked up: Thrasher Foundation Repair-\$1544.84 and Comstock Concrete Lifting-\$4882.30. He received 2 bids to have the concrete replaced: MG Construction-\$4900.00 and Cisneros Construction LLC-\$5500.00. Commissioner Hohenstein moved, seconded by Commissioner Van Berkum to award the project to Thrasher Foundation Repair to have the concrete lifted for \$1,544.84 to be paid out of the Building and Grounds budget. ROLL CALL VOTE: Van Berkum-Yes, Bousquet-Yes, Reed-Yes, Hohenstein-Yes, Rodriguez-Yes. UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Commissioner Bousquet explained that he had met with Todd Uhl, Jail Maintenance, and they are working on a list of routine maintenance that needs to be addressed. The age of the jail is starting to show. Commissioner Hohenstein suggested putting this list together with some figures and try to work these routine maintenance repairs into the budget.

Jolene Gubbels, Highway Superintendent, M Avenue change orders. Josh Keithly with Midwest Engineering did not have the paperwork ready, but he did talk to Cooney and there would be no charge to change the width of the road from 28 to 30 feet. Change Order to do the gravel embedment would be around \$50,000. Ms. Gubbels said this could be paid for using the Federal Aid Road Fund. She informed that letters have been sent out to residents that live on that road regarding the start date of this project. Commissioner Bousquet moved, seconded by Commissioner Van Berkum to approve a Change Order for the M Avenue Road project from Cooney Construction for the gravel embedment to be paid for using Federal Aid Road Funds. ROLL CALL VOTE: Bousquet-Yes, Reed-Yes, Hohenstein-Yes, Rodriguez-Yes, Van Berkum-Yes. UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Commissioner Hohenstein moved, seconded by Commissioner Bousquet to appoint Dean Pallas to the Road Foreman position. ROLL CALL VOTE: Reed-Yes, Hohenstein-Yes, Rodriguez-Yes, Van Berkum-Yes, Bousquet-Yes, UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Jolene Gubbels, Highway Superintendent, informed the Board that Boyer Sand & Rock out of Hawarden, IA submitted a gravel pricing bid from March 17, 2025 through March 2, 2026 and the prices are good. Finding places to purchase gravel is getting harder and further away. Commissioner Van Berkum moved, seconded by Commissioner Reed to approve the gravel bid from Boyer Sand & Rock out of Hawarden, IA from March 17, 2025 through March 2, 2026. ROLL CALL VOTE: Hohenstein-Yes, Rodriguez-Yes, Van Berkum-Yes, Bousquet-Yes, Reed-Yes. UNANIMOUS MOTION CARRIED.

Jolene Gubbels, Highway Superintendent, presented the Bi-weekly Road Report for March 16 to March 29, 2025. Total Road Maintenance – 152.5 hours; Overtime hours – 39 hours; Tree/Debris removal – 13 hours; Culverts – 15 hours (110<sup>th</sup> St); Snow removal – 112 hours; Magnet- 2 hours; Gravel hauling – 107 hours; 889.85 tons hauled on roads. Road concerns: Grading – G Ave, 230<sup>th</sup>, Millis beach, Wigle Creek. Hired weed/sign employee and 3 road employees. Board talked about the amount of tires and garbage that is being dumped in the county ditches. Suggested signs be placed with fine enforced and Sheriff's department checking into cameras on the worst roads.

Commissioner Committee Reports: Commissioner Rodriquez attended an Area on Aging meeting. Commissioner Bousquet attended an LEC meeting. They are having trouble hiring and retaining employees and are working on increased raises and benefits.

Mail and/or Emergency Business: Shared letter regarding road work this summer on Highway 110.

Commissioner Van Berkum moved, seconded by Commissioner Bousquet, to adjourn the meeting. All in favor. Chair Hohenstein adjourned the Board of Commissioners meeting of March 31, 2025, at 3:57 p.m.
